

Proposed Tree List for 1525-2055 N JANTZEN AVE

Crape myrtle (*Lagerstroemia* spp.)

Small, showy arborescent shrub/tree with peeling bark and flashy floral display. It has a rounded to vase-like shape. Many cultivars; the varieties we plant range from 15-20 feet tall at maturity. Oak, Bambooleaf (*Quercus myrsinifolia*)

Broad, rounded evergreen oak. A reasonable expectation for mature size is 20-30 feet tall and wide. This broadleaf evergreen will not drop its leaves all at once in the autumn, but it will produce acorns. Acorn production may vary year to year. More information:

Oak, canyon live (*Quercus chrysolepis*)

Mature size varies greatly with growing conditions. A reasonable expectation for mature size is 40-60 feet tall with a broad, shady canopy. This broadleaf evergreen will not drop its leaves all at once in the autumn, but it will produce acorns. Acorn production may vary year to year. Oak, Oregon white (*Quercus garryana*)

Iconic Willamette Valley native. Slow growing, 50+ feet over decades. Broad, rounded canopy with the potential to be as wide as tall. Acorn production may vary year to year. More information: <https://landscapeplants.oregonstate.edu/plants/quercus-garryana>

Pacific madrone (*Arbutus menziesii*)

Mature size and shape vary. A reasonable expectation for mature size is 40+ feet tall. This broadleaf evergreen sports glossy green leaves, red, peeling bark and a charismatic, irregular growth form. More information:

Ponderosa pine (*Pinus ponderosa*)

Tall and narrow needled evergreen, develops attractive cinnamon bark with maturity. A reasonable expectation for mature size is 60+ feet tall.

Shore pine (*Pinus contorta*)

Small-medium native conifer. Highly adaptable. Expected to mature 20-40 feet with an irregular form. Evergreen. More information:

Strawberry tree (*Arbutus unedo*)

Broad-leaved evergreen with shaggy red-brown bark. This tree is a relative of our native madrone, but smaller. Produces $\frac{3}{4}$ " fruits reminiscent in appearance (not taste) to strawberries. Expected mature size around 20 feet tall. More information:

Optional Shrubs - fill between trees

Blue blossom ceanothus (*Ceanothus thyrsiflorus*)

Large evergreen shrub with blue flowers that attract pollinators. Heat and drought tolerant. A reasonable expectation for mature size is 12-20 feet.

Manzanita (*Arctostaphylos manzanita*)

Small but broad and rounded woody shrub/tree with red bark and bell-shaped flowers.

Leaves remain green year-round. We plant varieties maturing around 10+ feet. More

Red Flowering Currant (*Ribes sanguineum*)
